#### **HOUSE GUEST WRAP-UP**

Very Entertaining...if just a bit Ridiculous!

Ewen Crockett reviews *House Guest* for the VDL's *Theatrecraft's* magazine

I have to admit that the first few minutes of this play put me into a "ho-hum" state of mind and wishing that I was home with my book which had reached an interesting point... Then I realised that something clever was happening up there on the stage.

Director Cameron South has taken a play written in 1982, reminiscent of a 1940s murder mystery (*The Ghost Train, Turn of the Screw*, etc) and set it in 1996. WHY? I shout, metaphorically and quietly of course.... Answer: because this play could not have worked any other way. It was a send-up of the genre done in a different style and I congratulate the director for having the courage to go with his conviction. It did not totally work, but that is the director's choice and can always be questioned or misinterpreted. I think that it would be nothing less than a disaster if taken seriously, as was probably the author's intention.

The play deals with a convoluted plot including the kidnapping of the Drurys son and visitations by a host of spurious individuals, most of who manage to wind up dead.

Complete with a 1996 set (which was very well put together and obviously lovingly dressed), anachronistic dialogue, ill-fitting costumes and over-acting, we were treated to the very best of the very worst am-dram. An inspired and very courageous concept.

Glenn Hunt, as Robert Drury and Philip Henderson, was remarkable as he "square-shouldered and with feet planted firmly" bombasted his way through the difficulties with which his characters were confronted. Never quite believable, as was intended, but with a great deal of conviction and energy.

Philippa Bain, as Stella Drury, remained almost calm throughout the ordeal, seemingly less concerned by the fact that her son had been kidnapped than that strangers had occupied her house. Whatever may be, their purpose appeared to be incidental and dead bodies were just an inconvenience, so long as somebody cleaned up the mess and "Oh, can I please have my son back soon?"

Michael Redmond, as Inspector Burford, dead-panned his way through some of the most impossible lines ever written and managed to make them entertaining and almost plausible. Not an easy task, so well done.

The other members of the cast, Janna Wright as Jane Mercer, Jean Millward as Vivien Norwood, Marcus Ingleby as Major Crozier, Brendan Allan as Sergeant Clayton and Leanne Savage as Dorothy Medway, all maintained the melodramatic style of the production and all deserve plaudits for bringing what is a very poorly scripted play to life.

Lighting and sound were basic plots but were effective in adding to the melodramatic foolery.

Thanks to Peridot, the cast and the crew for this rather ridiculous, but quite entertaining, piece of theatre.

An Evening with Brian Hatfield: "The Power of Yes"



Our August 27 Play Reading took a different form from usual with a guest presenter, Brian Hatfield.

Brian is widely experienced in many areas of the performing arts and is currently working as an acting coach and teacher in Vienna. While planning a trip to

visit his parents in Pinewood, Brian found Peridot Theatre on the internet (the wonders of technology!), noticed that we have a Play Reading Group and promptly offered to run an evening for us.

The play he chose was David dare's "The Power of Yes", which concerns the 2008 Global financial crisis. Not the most promising topic for a play you might think, but under Brian's expert guidance we all became rapidly absorbed in the unfolding drama. The play takes the form of "The Author" investigating the causes and consequences of the crisis by interviewing a range of observers and participants. The sheer arrogance of those responsible was simply breathtaking, and Dare aptly compares the event to a tragedy in five acts.

#### ...the last word

Who is or was the Worst Singer of all time? No, it isn't Bob Dylan. Well, maybe.... But perhaps one Florence Foster Jenkins might fill the bill.

The glory of the human voice has never had fuller expression than in the career of Florence. La Jenkins was not apologetically low key in her badness; she was defiantly and gloriously dreadful. No one, before or since, has succeeded in liberating themselves from the shackles of musical notation. Opera was her medium and she squawked heroically through the best known arias with a refreshing abandon.

From her birth in Pennsylvania in 1864 to her debut 40 years later, it is fair to say that neither her parents nor her husband gave the slightest encouragement to her musical ambitions. Then her father died and left his fortune and, with this newfound wealth, she launched her assault upon the musical world by funding everything associated with staging a opera – with of course her in the lead role.

Her flair for dress design fully equaled her singing gift and, in any concert, thrilled audiences were treated to a minimum of three costume changes. One minute she would appear sporting an immense pair of wings to render 'Ave Maria'. The next she would emerge in the garb of a senorita, with a rose between her teeth and a basket full of flowers to unload her Spanish showstopper, 'Cavelitos'. In this song she would punctuate every verse by hurling rosebuds into the audience. Once she also hurled the basket as well.

The audience could always tell when she was going to grant an encore. She would dispatch her overworked accompanist Cosme McMoon out into the auditorium to collect up the flowers so that she might repeat her triumph.

On 26 October 1944, she hired and filled to capacity the Carnegie Hall in New York for her farewell appearance. She started disappointingly with three correct notes, but her admirers need not have feared. Before long she abandoned pitch, stave and key and was as out of tune as it is possible to be without coming back in tune again.



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
