

Farewell Robyn



It is with great sadness that we have to report that our great friend and absolute Peridot stalwart Robyn Kelly has resigned from our Board of Management, bringing to an end her magnificent involvement with our Company over the past 25 years. She has undeniably made a pivotal contribution to the fine success of Peridot and we and many in Melbourne's theatre community owe her a great debt of gratitude.

For many recent years Robyn's roles have been as our Artistic Director and Coordinator of the Monash One Act Play Festival which we have successfully held for the past seven years, but, because of her vast experience, enthusiasm, love of theatre generally and her great font of common sense, her contribution goes way past those two important but also taxing responsibilities. In recent times she has felt the burden more onerous; she has suffered some ill health and has also recognized a desire to have a life beyond the demands of Peridot, including the opportunity to travel in 2015 with her husband John and to enjoy even more her two beautiful young grandchildren.

Robyn became involved with the Company in 1989, the year she made her first appearance on our stage in My Friend Miss Flint, which was the first and only time she performed on stage with her sister Tarit. The play was directed by Gaye Gay and was the beginning of a great collaboration and friendship between the two. She went on to appear in eight further full scale productions and a host of One Act Plays; she also successfully directed five OAPs for us. She came on the Board of Management in 1994, where she held the position of Chairman for several years and as Artistic Director for the past seven years. Robyn was deservedly made a Peridot Life member in 2000 in recognition of her great contribution to our company.

When asked what are her greatest memories or moments in the years she has been involved with Peridot, she said there were so many it was hard to say, but she specifically loved:

*The absolute privilege to be a cast member in *Minefields* and Miniskirts, the brilliant play depicting the experiences of five women in Vietnam during the war there that we presented in 2009. Robyn says "It was an emotional experience for me due to John having served in Vietnam as a conscript. This play will stay with me for the rest of my life."

(Minefields and Miniskirts, directed by Gaye Gay, surely ranks as one of the finest production we have ever done -Ed). Continued in the next column...

*Establishing the Monash One Act Play Festival and giving the opportunity for local playwrights to have their work performed.

*Making fantastic friendships along the way and sharing together our love of theatre.

*Being made a Life member of Peridot.

*Doing the lovely two-hander *Love Letters* and sharing the stage with my great friend Paul Sedgwick.

We are all truly in Robyn's debt for her enthusiasm and skills over so many years and we sincerely give her and John all our love and best wishes.

Our Gave's at it again!


In our March 2012 edition of Gems we sadly told you that our long-time Peridot stalwarts Grant and Gaye Gay were retiring and heading for new horizons and a spot of peace and quiet in Queensland. In their time at Peridot Gaye had directed no less that 23 plays between 1988 and 2010, and Grant had appeared in more productions than anyone else in our history. We know they have settled very happily there and have also done a great deal of overseas exploring since then, but it comes as no surprise to us that Gaye could not, in the long term, help herself. Yes, she's directed a play at a local theatre company in nearby Nerand! She's got herself carefully back into gear by directing a lovely English comedy which she earlier had directed at Peridot in 2004, Mr Wonderful, and we're sure she won't mind if we print the review from the local newspaper.

"Mr Wonderful" by James Robson at the Javeenbah Theatre, Nerand, Queensland Sept 26- Oct 11

Mr Wonderful explores the relationship between a bedridden, meddling mother Phoebe Green, beautifully played by Virginia Leaver, and her middle aged, spinster daughter Norma, sympathetically portrayed by Naomi Thompson and the occasional males that she and her mother pick out of a catalogue of "lonely hearts".

The male "love interests", Trevor Love and Michael Denny, trying (unsuccessfully) to find a mate by trawling through the same catalogue, meet with Norma with varying comic results. Meanwhile Phoebe's constant companion is an oversized teddy bear who is privy to her various schemes. Continued on page three...

To finish off another year of fine theatre at Peridot, we are delighted to present a terrific English comedy Key for Two, written by two of the finest writers of farce, John Chapman and Dave Freeman. The action centres around Harriet, a divorcee living in an elegant flat in Brighton, on the south coast of England. She solves her financial problems by entertaining two married gentleman callers on different days of the week. Each man thinks he is the only one in Harriet's life and she orchestrates their comings and goings with elegant artistry. However, the scheme faces collapse when her friend Anne, whose marriage is failing, arrives at the flat hotly pursued by her husband. The confusion that ensues builds to a rich complexity of mistaken identity splendidly farcical situations and a climax of comic wizardry - just what you need to wrap up another Peridot year.


For this production we have one of Melbourne's finest directors of comedy,

We're Looking for a new Artistic Director

Following the resignation of Robyn Kelly after many years of being a wonderful and creative Artistic Director, Peridot is seeking expressions of interest in this important and creative position.

The successful candidate will have an extensive knowledge of theatre and a clear vision for the future direction of the company. Responsibilities include recommending a well balanced program suitable for our audience; organising production rights and awards submissions; and liaising with directors, production coordinators and members of the Board of Management.

Artistic Director Portfolio Duties

The Artistic Director sets the tone and direction of the Company and is responsible for seeing that the mission statement reflects audience interests. This covers two areas:

PRODUCTION PLANNING

- Contact Directors as suggested by the Company and request they submit plays for production.
- Check with appropriate bodies if the rights are available for these plays.
- Organise the reading of these submissions by appropriate Board members.
- Bring final recommendation to Board for annual programme.
- Liaise with Directors as to the Board's decision and supply them with the Director's Guidelines with production specific information.
- Arrange with school that the dates are available for each season.
- Arrange with Business Manager to apply for rights.
- Collate the copy for the annual subscription form and liaise with the Artistic Designer, Printer and Ticket Manager.
- Maintain liaison with each Production Coordinator during each production period.
- May represent the Board at auditions and production meetings.

• MANAGEMENT DUTIES

- Prepare monthly report for each Management Meeting.
- Coordinate PERI Award adjudicators and discuss guidelines, ensuring that adjudicators have necessary skills and information to perform their functions.
- Oversee Lyrebird and VDL Award matters.
- Coordinate Peridot's involvement in One Act Play Festivals.
- Source new plays and encourage new play writing talent.
